Short course description

This course discusses three major detective formulas; classical, hard-boiled and anti-detective, to emerge over the history of the detective genre since its invention by Edgar Allan Poe in 1841 until the present. The course will also discuss two subgenres in detective cinema that emerge since the late 1920s until the present: the *film noir* and *neo-film noir*. The characteristics of the detective figure and his/her detective method are significant factors for distinguishing the detective sub-genres. Another significant factor is whether the conundrum is finally resolved or not, which determines the overall orientation of the detective plot.

תקציר

הקורס עוסק בהתפתחות הז'אנר הבלשי מאז המצאתו על ידי הסופר האמריקאי אדגר אלן פו במאה ה19 עד להווה. קיימים בעיקר שלושה תת-סוגים בספרות הבלשית: קלאסי, ריאליסטי קשוח, ואנטי-בלשי. במקביל, הקורס ידון בהתפתחות הקולנוע הבלשי אשר הופיע לראשונה בתחילת המאה העשרים בצורה "הסרט השחור" והתפתח לסוג אחר שנחשב ל"סרט השחור החדש". שני מאפיינים חשובים להשוואה בין תת הסוגים של הז'אנר הבלשי הם: דמות הבלש ושיטת החקירה. מעבר לכך, הסיום של הז'אנר הבלשי הטקסט הבלשי.
