Roots of the Western Literary Tradition Fall Semester, 2023-2024

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Mondays 12:15-13:45
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Course Description:

This course is devoted to some of the foundational texts of Western culture, offering both a rich source of social, historical and philosophical conceptions, and indispensable background for literary studies. We will thus analyze the key genres, forms, themes and ideas underlying not only these texts, but many of our modern notions and artistic creations. The course will focus on ancient mythology, Greek poetry and philosophy, Roman poetry, and the Bible in both its Hebrew and Christian manifestations.

I ask that you come to class, read the assigned texts based on the syllabus, contribute your own thoughts, and share your insights and challenges. It is also important that you submit answers to the study questions (on Moodle) before each class and submit the two written assignments, all of which will help sharpen your analytical skills and understanding, as well as offer practice for the final paper.

You may use a computer/tablet in class. The use of electronics for matters unrelated to class, however, besides being counterproductive and disrespectful, will affect your grade. At times, for purposes of discussion, I will ask that all electronics be put away.

Phones are not allowed in class! If you have pressing matters, please let me know before class and then feel free go outside to text/talk on the phone.
