This course is the second half of an advanced introduction to syntax within the framework of generative grammar. The goal is to become familiar with theoretical concepts and principles, and to develop skills in syntactic description, analysis and argumentation. Prerequisites: Syntax A.

# The fine structure of VP

Word-formation in the syntax, bound morphemes as syntactic heads, The Head Movement Constraint, causative little v (CAUS), deadjectival change-of-state verbs.

Unaccusative (anticausative) verbs, incohative little v (BECOM), silent and overt causatives, directionality of derivation, gaps and "listedness", abstract trees and phonological suppletion, repetitive/restitutive ambiguity.

Superiority, the Minimal Link Condition, resumptive pronouns, island-sensitivity as a movement diagnostic, grand summary. Receive Ex. 4
