Course description & objectives:

Exploring the range of fantasies, desires, fears, and obsessions that preoccupied Britain in the 1890s, this course will approach the *fin de siècle* as a crucial turning point in British culture. Reading novels, short stories, plays, poems and journalistic work by various authors, the course will examine how the literature of the period reflected shifts in Britain's political, social, urban, and cultural landscape. Themes will include the rise of the "New Woman"; the emergence of new literary movements, such as Aestheticism, Decadence and Symbolism; new sciences - criminology, psychology, and sexology; new visual technologies of communication and entertainment; anxieties concerning degeneration and the fate of Empire; and the interest in the occult.
