Re: Updates to National Security Council travel warnings - Tishrei holidays 2019

Greetings,

- Enclosed is an update on the National Security Council's terrorism travel warnings for the Tishrei holidays: New Year,29/9-1/10/19, Yom Kippur, 8-9 October, 2019, and Sukkoth, 13-20 October, 2019. These holidays may present an objective to terrorists carrying out attacks against Israeli and Jewish targets abroad.
- 2. The travel warnings are based on solid and reliable information, representing real threats, and are based on an intelligence overview for the said period.
- 3. Main emphases of the overview:
 - a. Terrorist activities around the world continue to pose a threat. Over the past year, hundreds of terrorist attacks took place around the world every month, with a focus on the Middle East, Africa and across Asia. Global Jihad activists (affiliated primarily with ISIS and with Al Qaeda) are still active around the world.
 - b. The potential risk to Israelis abroad is still real, and is the result of the activities of global Jihadist groups, Iranian and Hezbollah capabilities and infrastructures, and the effects of the Palestinian arena.
 - c. It should be emphasized that Israelis are forbidden to travel to enemy states Syria, Iraq (including Kurdistan), Iran, Lebanon, Yemen and Saudi Arabia by the Law on Prevention of Infiltration.
 - d. **The Islamic State (ISIS)**: the organization is active simultaneously in several arenas across the world. These pose a terrorist threat and might promote local terrorist activities in a number of areas, particularly in Sinai, West Africa, and Central Asia.
 - e. Al Qaeda: The organization aspires to return to the forefront of world Jihad and promote terrorist attacks, including attacks on Israeli/Jewish targets, through its global branches:
 - i. The organization continues to dominate in the Horn of Africa (East Africa), the Sahara and North Africa, certain areas in central/south Asia (Afghanistan, Pakistan, India) and the Middle East. At the same time, the organization aspires to gain a better foothold in the West.
 - ii. Israel is fairly high on the organization's list of priorities and, given the opportunity, its agents will not hesitate to advance a concrete operation against Israeli/Jewish targets in the spaces where it operates.
 - f. **Western countries**: the potential for terrorism is relevant and present, with the motivation to carry out terrorist attacks still high. Several types of attacks are possible: stabbing, vehicular, shooting and suicide bombs. 'Lone wolf' attacks and local initiatives are the greatest threat in the West.
 - g. **Hezbollah and Iran**: they continue to prepare for "Command Day", building capabilities for execution of attacks around the world.

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- h. Sinai: the threat level in Sinai remains very high. In light of continued ISIS activity and Al Qaeda gaining ground, they may collaborate to attack Israelis in the peninsula. The Egyptian Army has crippled ISIS' ability to operate throughout the area, but the potential for the attacks is still high and real. In light of the above, the National Security Council recommends that people listen to the warnings and avoid travelling to Sinai.
- i. **Turkey**: a region with high risk potential for Israelis, in light of the infrastructure and intentions of terrorist organizations.

Additional countries where threat to Israelis is high are Jordan and Egypt.

- 4. This information is provided to you in order to keep you apprised of travel warnings. Prior to approving travel abroad, you are requested to inform the relevant elements.
- 5. With regards to the countries which the National Security Council advises to avoid visiting, the University Security Department instructions are to refrain from travel to them.
